Zimbabwe should increase the share of national budget to agriculture, intensify and sustain efforts to promote foreign and domestic private investments and partnerships in agriculture in order to increase investment finance in agriculture and for promoting trade in agricultural commodities within the region through value chain prioritization. Zimbabwe should also create incentives for women participation in agriculture for poverty reduction through interventions that would enhance access to agricultural inputs, productivity-enhancing technologies and finance. Zimbabwe should promote and intensify efforts to reduce food and nutrition security through post-harvest management, micro-nutrient deficiencies through nutrition-sensitive interventions such as biofortification.
